

Report on Fundraiser for the evacuation and care of injured and sick animals, 12.0

We spent **UAH 1,004,427.11** (~\$24,203). The remaining UAH 953.35 will be put towards the next project for help

Friends, you often ask us how exactly your donations help animals. We truly value this trust, which is why we always strive to report on every fundraiser as transparently as possible 🙌

So that you can see and feel the results of your support through specific numbers and lives saved, we have prepared this report.

🚌 Thanks to your donations to this fundraiser, we carried out three evacuation trips to the Donetsk and Zaporizhzhia regions. During these trips, we managed to save 114 animals: two horses, 45 goats, one rabbit, as well as dozens of cats and dogs.



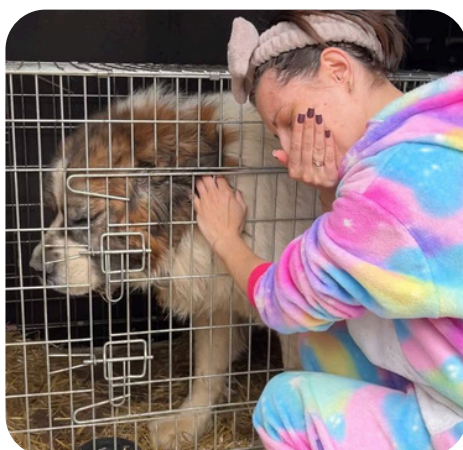
In addition, we covered fuel expenses for a trip by Natalia Popova from the Wild Animal Rescue Center to the Sumy region. During this trip, the **wolf named Baik** was evacuated.

A total of **UAH 113,366 (~\$2,731)** was spent on evacuation trips. This amount includes fuel costs, food and accommodation for the team, as well as the purchase of supplies, such as food, hay, straw, pads, carriers, and more.



🚐 We also carried out three trips to transport 96 previously rescued animals that were undergoing treatment at veterinary clinics. They were taken to families and shelters. We spent **UAH 95,057 (~\$2,290)**.

In addition, we covered fuel expenses for volunteers from the Save Animals organization who, at our request, transported 26 previously rescued animals to families and shelters. We spent **UAH 20,953.31 (~\$504)**.



❤️ As part of this fundraiser, we also covered veterinary procedures for evacuated animals. Help was provided to 21 cats and kittens, 58 dogs and puppies, the wolf named Baik, and one chinchilla.

We also covered the cremation costs for a puppy that, unfortunately, could not be saved.

Here are the details.

❤️ We paid for hospitalization, examination, X-rays, parasite treatment, catheterization, infusion therapy, surgical wound treatment, a follow-up examination and consultation, as well as surgery to remove the injured eye for **Winnie-the-Pooh, a dog evacuated from Druzhkivka**, Donetsk region. We spent **UAH 55,010 (~\$1,325)**.

Winnie-the-Pooh was evacuated by the Kharkiv Rescue Service at the request of his caretaker. She asked not only to take the dog out of the war zone but also to help cover the cost of eye treatment. According to the woman, the dog was injured after being attacked by other dogs. Unfortunately, due to the severity of the injury, veterinarians in Kharkiv had to remove Winnie-the-Pooh's eye.

After the surgery, the dog stayed in inpatient care for almost a month. When his condition stabilized, and we contacted his caretaker, she said that she had left the country and would not be able to take Winnie-the-Pooh back. After completing treatment, the dog was transferred to the Druh shelter in Dnipro.



❤️ We covered fuel costs for evacuating the **wolf Baik** from the Sumy region, remote anesthesia, and the first stage of treatment. This included a clinical examination, catheterization, collection and performance of general and biochemical blood tests, abdominal ultrasound, a distemper test, skin scraping examination, treatments against endo- and ectoparasites, comprehensive vaccination, ear canal cleaning, intravenous infusions, as well as antibacterial and corticosteroid therapy. We spent **UAH 33,160 (≈\$799)**.

The animal lived in an enclosure five kilometers from the Russian border. In a very serious condition, he was evacuated by Natalia Popova, head of the Wild Animal Rescue Center. Due to the effects of tick infestation, the tissue on the wolf's ears was irreversibly damaged. In addition, the wolf has problems with both his psychological state and internal organs. He is very weak and frightened.



❤️ We covered the costs of hospitalization, food, medication, and medical supplies for the **dog named Liubomyr (Lord)**, who was injured during a Russian shelling attack on Kherson. This included blood tests, bacteriological examination, catheterization, X-rays, vaccination, a test for dirofilariasis, sedation, surgical wound treatment and suturing, bandage changes, heart ultrasound, echocardiography, infusion therapy, computed tomography, as well as analgesics, anesthetics, antibiotics, anti-inflammatory drugs, sedatives, antispasmodics, and sorbents. We spent **UAH 97,425.80 (≈\$2,347)**.

Liubomyr was evacuated by volunteers from the Tobias organization from Kherson. During Russian artillery shelling in Kindiika, the dog injured his paw, and there was no possibility of helping him in the city. The animal was transported to Odesa.

After the volunteers shared the rescue story, the dog's caretakers contacted us. It turned out that his real name was Lord, and he had gone missing four months earlier. The family had been searching for him all this time and, after learning that he had been found, asked to have the dog returned after treatment. His family said they would wait for him no matter what.



❤ For **21 animals** (8 cats and 13 dogs) evacuated from the Zaporizhzhia region, we covered various veterinary procedures. In particular, for the Rottweiler Tyson — hospitalization and examination. Hospitalization, examination, tests for viral diseases, parasite treatments, and vaccination for eight cats and one dog. Hospitalization, examinations, parasite treatments, and vaccination, as well as sterilization for one of the seven dogs. We also covered hospitalization, examination, parasite treatments, and vaccination for two puppies, and for their mother, including hospitalization, examination, parasite treatments, vaccination, and sterilization. We spent **UAH 141,571 (~\$3411)**.



💖 For **59 animals** previously evacuated from frontline regions, we covered boarding and feeding costs. In particular, for 28 dogs, 27 cats, and four puppies. We spent **UAH 33,448 (~\$805)**.

💖 For **23 animals** previously evacuated from frontline regions, we covered boarding and feeding costs. In particular, for ten dogs, 12 cats, and one puppy. We spent **UAH 30,806 (~\$742)**.



💖 We covered various veterinary procedures for **47 animals** (30 puppies, nine cats, seven dogs, and one chinchilla) evacuated from the Donetsk and Kharkiv regions. In particular, for nine cats — hospitalization, examinations, and tests for viral diseases; and for seven dogs — hospitalization, examinations, parasite treatments, vaccination, sterilization, suture treatment, ultrasound, and blood tests. For the chinchilla, we covered hospitalization and examination costs. We also covered vaccination for 30 puppies evacuated from the Donetsk region. We spent **UAH 187,099 (~\$4,508)**.



❤️ For **Shona, an Alabai dog** who was evacuated at our request by volunteer Olena Barbaianova from Pokrovske, Dnipropetrovsk region, we covered treatment costs totaling **UAH 41,160 (~\$991)**.

At the clinic, the dog underwent a cardiologist examination, blood tests, a test for dirofilariasis, an electrocardiogram, X-rays, ultrasound and echocardiography of the heart, skin scraping, cytological examination, and otoscopy. Shona was also prescribed antibacterial and antifungal medications, as well as antibiotics.



❤️ We covered an examination, catheterization, injections, and antibiotics for a puppy from Kramatorsk, evacuated at the soldier's request. The bill also included costs for examinations, feeding, and boarding of other previously evacuated animals. We spent **UAH 25,064 (~\$603)**.



❤️ For the **dog Mira**, evacuated from the Donetsk region, we covered the cost of veterinary medications needed to continue her treatment. We spent **UAH 6,970 (≈\$167)**.



❤️ We covered the costs of an examination, hospitalization, sterilization, vaccination, biochemical and general blood tests, ultrasound, catheterization, and infusion therapy for a **cat named Fialka**, evacuated from Kramatorsk. We spent **UAH 29,810 (≈\$718)**.

One day before our evacuation, Fialka gave birth to stillborn kittens, and her condition was critical. The team quickly transported the cat to the nearest veterinary clinic in Kharkiv, where doctors managed to stabilize her condition.



❤️ For a **dog named Gerda** from Kramatorsk, we covered catheterization, veterinary examinations, hospitalization, X-rays, sedation, food, medical supplies, treatments, and veterinary medications. We spent **UAH 22,433 (≈\$540)**.



❤️ For the **dog Zoia**, evacuated from the village of Zarichne in the Zaporizhzhia region, we covered the costs of the initial examination, ultrasound, general and biochemical blood tests, surgery to remove a tumor and its examination, as well as food, hospitalization, and post-operative care. We spent **UAH 30,217 (≈\$728)**.



❤️ We covered hospitalization, post-operative care, food, and medical supplies for **three cats** handed over by a soldier. We spent **UAH 35,862 (≈\$864)**. After discharge, the cats were transferred to the Kotokhata shelter.

❤️ We covered the costs of an examination, hospitalization, food, parasite treatment, vaccination, injections, and medical supplies for **a dog that a soldier helped evacuate** from the village of Zhovtenke in the Zaporizhzhia region. We spent **UAH 3,015 (≈\$72)**.



❤️ We covered cremation costs for a **puppy whose help was requested by soldiers**. We spent **UAH 2,000 (≈\$48)**.

Soldiers contacted us about a sick puppy that was staying at their positions. They were taking the little one to a veterinary clinic in Dnipro, but unfortunately, the puppy passed away on the way.

Unfortunately, not every story has a happy ending. There are animals we do not manage to save in time. But every life is worth fighting for.
