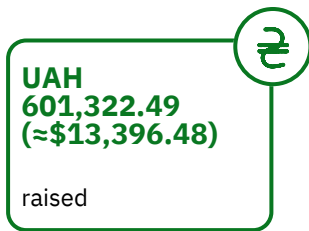
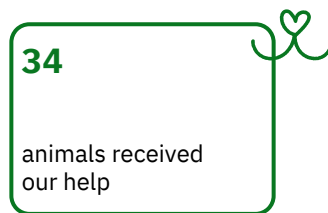


# Report on Fundraiser for the treatment of animals cared for by soldiers, 7.0



**2 639 donors** supported the fundraiser. We also used the remaining funds from our previous fundraiser for treating animals cared for by soldiers




We spent **UAH 603,079.43 (≈\$13,435.62)**. The remaining UAH 206.74 (≈\$5) will be put towards the next fundraiser for treatment

**In frontline cities and villages, life is always hard. But despite everything, soldiers rescue animals seeking shelter with them.**

**We cannot leave these animals without help. Thanks to your donations, we were able to cover the cost of treatment, surgeries, tests, and essential medications for the animals under soldiers' care. Together, we have supported those who, even in the most difficult conditions, find the strength to save lives.**

**Read the stories of the animals we have helped this time.**

 A soldier found a **puppy named Ihorko** on the roadside of the Orihivska road in the Zaporizhzhia region. The four-month-old puppy was injured, could only crawl, and could not get up on his paws. He had likely been hit by a car, so the soldier immediately took the puppy to a veterinary clinic.

During the examination, Ihorko was diagnosed with fractures of the pelvis and femur. We covered the costs of hospitalization, X-rays, ultrasound examination, medications, vaccination, and specialized nutrition. After a course of treatment and recovery, Ihorko was able to walk on his own again.



The best news — after his recovery, the puppy was taken to his new family.

We spent **UAH 19,775.00 (≈\$440.55)** on helping Ihorko.



🩹 Soldiers brought a **cat named Marsyk** to the clinic after an injury he sustained in a guided bomb attack. A shrapnel fragment damaged his chest.

We covered the costs of hospitalization, X-rays, tests, infusion therapy, medications, and specialized care. Thanks to the treatment, Marsyk's condition was stabilized — he started eating on his own and gradually began to recover.

Unfortunately, Marsyk later suffered a stroke that developed against the background of his severe condition after the shelling and the injuries he had endured. Despite all the efforts of the veterinarians, he could not be saved.

We spent **UAH 32,349.00 (≈\$720.68)** on helping Marsyk.



🩹 Soldiers brought a **dog named Elza** to the clinic after they noticed a large growth on her abdomen.

We covered the costs of examination, surgery to remove the affected mammary gland, spaying, hospitalization, medications, vaccination, and parasite treatment. After the surgery, Elza remained under veterinary supervision and was gradually recovering.

Once the dog felt better, she was transferred to the rehabilitation center Bezprytulnyi Svit, where she continues to recover.

We spent **UAH 42,561.00 (~\$440.55)** on helping Elza.




🩹 Two **puppies named Charlie and Glatti** were brought to the clinic in critical condition. They were severely emaciated, had inflamed eyes, skin lesions, and were losing their fur.

Charlie and Glatti needed oxygen support, IV fluids, medication, and special food. They were too weak to maintain their body temperature, so they had to be kept warm at all times.

We covered their hospitalization, tests, catheterization, medications, oxygen therapy, and tube feeding. We also paid for blood tests — including complete blood count and biochemical blood test — as well as tests for babesiosis, distemper, and parvovirus, plus supplies, medications, and food.

Unfortunately, the puppies' bodies were too exhausted, and despite all the veterinarians' efforts, Charlie and Glatti could not be saved.

We spent **UAH 11,272.75 (≈\$251.14)** on helping the puppies.

 A soldier rescued a ten-year-old **cat named Murzik** from people who weren't looking after him properly. The soldier who took him in said Murzik would spend his days sitting on a cabinet by an open window — and would even climb out onto the roof through that window to relieve himself. Eventually, that took a toll on his health.

After the cat arrived at the clinic, the doctors performed a comprehensive examination. Suspicions of heart and kidney diseases were not confirmed, but the tests did reveal kidney dysfunction. In addition, Murzik was diagnosed with hemobartonellosis — an infectious blood disease. The cat underwent a course of treatment, and his condition was successfully stabilized.

We covered the costs of hospitalization, examinations, catheterization, drug administration, blood sampling, complete and biochemical blood tests, electrolyte analysis, medications, medical supplies, and food. After the treatment was completed, Murzik returned to the soldier who cares for him.

We spent **UAH 8,331 (≈\$185.60)** on helping this cat.

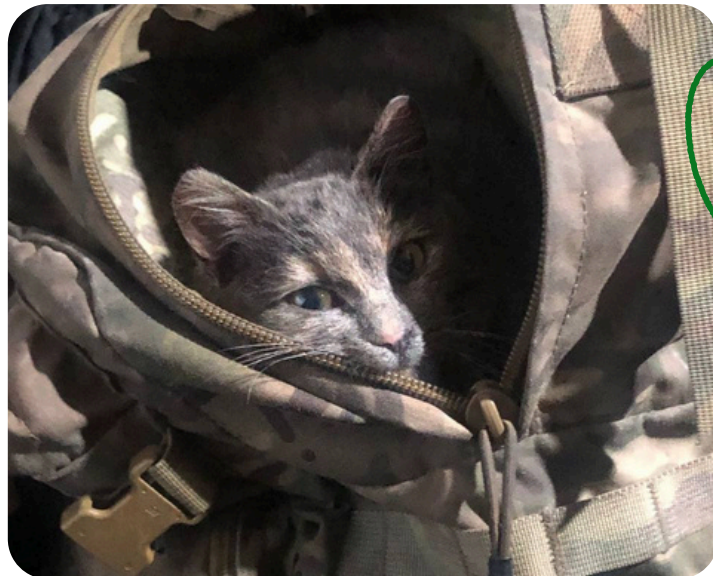


🩹 **A cat named Kira** came to the soldiers at their positions in the Kharkiv region. To save her, we provided the soldiers with a pet carrier, which allowed them to safely transport the cat to a veterinary clinic.

We covered the costs of the examination, laboratory tests, screening for infectious diseases, spaying, vaccination, and microchipping.

After all veterinary procedures were completed, Kira found a forever home — she was adopted by a foreign soldier who, together with his comrades, had been caring for her at their positions.

We spent **UAH 4,855 (≈\$108.16)** on helping Kira.



🩹 **Two cats, Godzilla and Lilitka**, were rescued by a soldier during her service on the front line. She first took in Lilitka, who kept her distance from other cats, and later gave a home to Godzilla as well.

After they were evacuated from the front-line area, Lilitka had difficulty adjusting to life indoors. It later turned out that she was pregnant. She gave birth to five kittens, and the soldier found loving families for all of them. Meanwhile, Lilitka had skin issues, and Godzilla had dental problems.

We covered the following costs for Godzilla: examinations, anesthesia, medication, injections, oral cavity treatment, ultrasound examination, extraction of two teeth, medications, supplies, and a follow-up appointment.

For Lilitka, we covered dermatology consultations, microscopic examination of an ear swab, a follow-up dermatology appointment, medications, and supplies. Today, Godzilla and Lilitka live together with the soldier who rescued them.

We spent **UAH 8,657.88 (~\$193)** on helping these animals.



🩹 **A dog named Hrishu** was brought to the clinic by soldiers after he was struck by a car. The accident left the animal with a severe leg injury.

After examination and stabilization of his condition, the doctors amputated the limb. Hrishu then spent time recovering in the clinic's inpatient ward. We covered the costs of hospitalization, food, parasite treatment, bandage changes, therapy, laboratory tests, and the surgery itself.

After recovery, Hrishu found his people — and they found him. He now has a loving home with a family that cares for him.

We spent **UAH 19,320 (~\$431)** on helping this dog.



🩹 **A dog named Prutyk** came to the soldiers at their positions. He was very emaciated and had a tumor on his leg, so the soldiers took him to a veterinary clinic.

There, Prutyk underwent a thorough examination, and once his condition had stabilized enough, the tumor was surgically removed. After the operation, the dog received follow-up treatment and recovered under the supervision of the medical team.

We covered the costs of hospitalization, blood tests, X-rays, vaccination, parasite treatment, the surgery itself, bandage changes, medication, and food. We spent **UAH 13,065 (~\$291)** on helping this dog.



🩹 **A puppy named Rem** lived with a group of soldiers. After the dog was struck by a car, the soldiers took him to a veterinary clinic.

During the examination, Rem was diagnosed with a fractured hind leg. We covered the costs of X-rays, blood tests, screening for infectious diseases, surgery to stabilize the broken leg, anesthesia, IV drips, medications, bandage changes, wound care, inpatient treatment, consultations, supplies, and nursing care.

After recovering, Rem returned to the soldiers.

We spent **UAH 34,888 (~\$777)** on helping this puppy.





🩹 **A cat named Biliash** did not return for several days to the soldier who cared for him. When he finally came back, he was limping heavily on his hind leg. Soon the leg became swollen, so the cat was taken to a veterinary clinic.

During the examination, the doctors diagnosed a non-displaced fracture of the leg. Surgery was not required – the cat received a stabilizing bandage, and after treatment, his leg improved significantly.

We covered the costs of hospitalization, food, bandage changes, injection therapy, X-rays, and vaccination.

After recovering, Biliash returned to the soldier who cares for him. We spent **UAH 7,192 (≈\$160)** on helping this cat.



🩹 **A dog named Lucy**, along with her eight puppies, was evacuated by a soldier from the Zaporizhzhia region. The animals were immediately taken to a veterinary clinic.

We covered the costs of examinations, blood tests, treatment, inpatient care, medications, and food for the entire family. For Lucy, we also covered the removal of diseased teeth, spaying, and vaccination.

After the treatment was completed, Lucy and her puppies were transferred to the shelter Give a Paw. Later, Lucy and one of her puppies found loving families. We spent **UAH 61,383 (≈\$1,368)** on helping Lucy and her puppies.



🩹 We covered the cost of spaying a dog cared for by the soldiers. We spent **UAH 1,800 (≈\$40)**.

**In this fundraiser, we also continued covering the treatment of animals whose stories we shared in our previous report. Here is an update on how we helped them this time.**

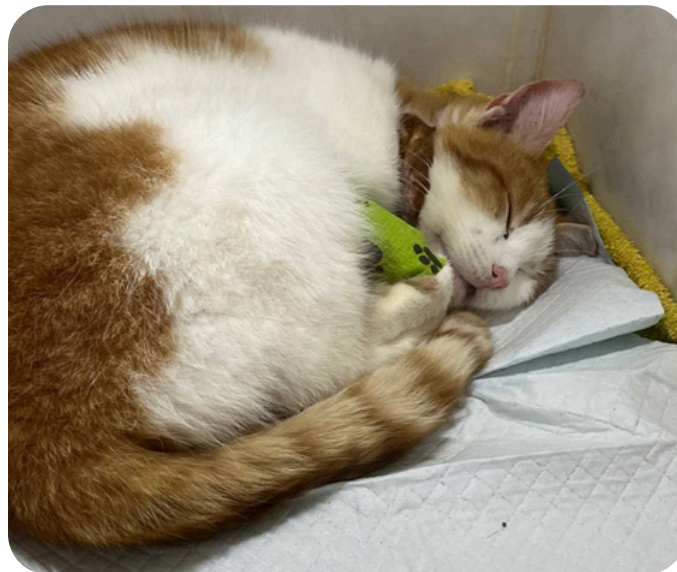
🩹 **For dog named Bobi**, we covered the costs of hospitalization, injection therapy, medications, bandage changes, food, parasite treatment, and rehabilitation.

We spent **UAH 13,400 (≈\$299)** on helping Bobi.



🩹 **For Ryzhyk**, a cat who is still undergoing treatment, we covered the costs of hospitalization, blood glucose monitoring, cardiac ultrasound, magnetic resonance imaging of the head, sedation for examinations and procedures, ear examinations, bacterial culture to test for infection, ear cleaning and flushing, administering ear, eye, and nose drops, complete and biochemical blood tests, blood sampling, injection therapy, ear surgery, medication, supportive care, food, and nursing.

We spent **UAH 81,764.50 (≈\$1,822)** on helping this cat.



🩹 For **three cats – Vasylisha, Sonia, and Barsik** – we covered various veterinary procedures.

For Vasylisha, we covered spaying, vaccination, parasite treatment, inpatient care, food, and supplies. After treatment, she was transferred to the shelter Favourite Animal.

For Sonia, we covered inpatient care, medications, treatment of the nasal and oral cavities, blood sampling, complete and biochemical blood tests, placement of an intravenous catheter, vaccination, parasite treatment, and supplies.

For Barsik, we covered inpatient care, medications, ear cleaning, neutering, oral cavity treatment, anesthesia, tooth extraction with gum suturing, placement

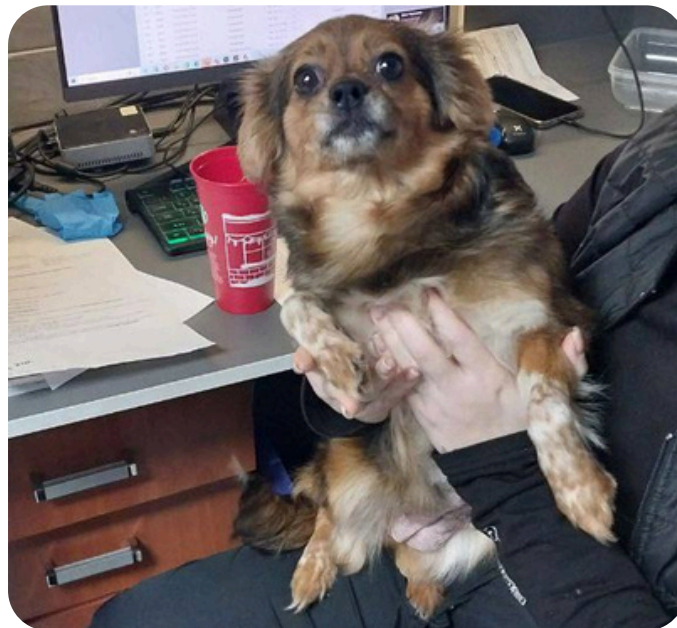
of an intravenous catheter, parasite treatment, vaccination, polymerase chain reaction (PCR) testing for feline leukemia virus, and supplies.

We spent **UAH 93,309.80 (~\$2,079)** on helping Vasylisha, Sonia, and Barsik.

🩹 **For a dog named Viktoriia**, we covered a follow-up examination and consultation, inpatient care, blood sampling, complete and biochemical blood tests, injection therapy, medications, spaying, vaccination, parasite treatment, nursing care, walking, and food.

After the treatment was completed, Viktoriia was transferred to the shelter Patron Pet Center.

We spent **UAH 13,581 (~\$303)** on helping this dog.



🩹 **For a kitten named Rusia**, we covered inpatient care, medications, nursing, surgical wound care, blood sampling, complete and biochemical blood tests, injections, drug administration, cleaning of the nose, eyes, and ears, neutering, and temporary partial suturing of the eyelids to protect the eye and promote healing.

After the treatment was completed, Rusia's condition stabilized, and the kitten was taken in by the soldier who cares for him.

We spent **UAH 39,677 (~\$884)** on helping this kitten.



🩹 In this fundraiser, we also continued covering the treatment of a dog named Frida. During her stay at the clinic, it turned out that Frida was pregnant. She later gave birth to five puppies.

We covered the costs of hospitalization, X-rays, ultrasound examination, blood sampling, complete blood count, injection therapy, drug administration, sedation, suture removal, removal of an external fixation device, postoperative wound care, parasite treatment, and vaccination.

We spent **UAH 47,267.50 (~\$1,053)** on helping Frida.

🩹 Within this fundraiser, we continued helping three dogs – **Zhuli, Roza, and Shakira.**

For Zhuli, we covered hospitalization, injection therapy, spaying, parasite treatment, rehabilitation, and food.

For Roza, we covered hospitalization, surgery to stabilize an injured leg, injection therapy, wound dressings, medications, parasite treatment, suture removal, rehabilitation, and food.

For Shakira, we covered hospitalization, injection therapy, medications, parasite treatment, rehabilitation, supplies, and food.

We spent **UAH 48,630 (≈\$1,083)** on helping Zhuli, Roza, and Shakira.
